The Kenneth Young Center's Employment Services Program staff will be presenting two workshops on consecutive Thursdays in March. Please plan on attending BOTH sessions.



It's been several months since I assumed the role as Township Clerk from my good friend Greg O'Brien, who moved out of the Township last fall. After many years serving as a Township Trustee, the transition to the position of Township Clerk has gone smoothly. In my new role, I've already had the

opportunity to communicate with many of you on a variety of subjects. Please do not hesitate to contact me or any of our outstanding staff whenever you have questions. The best way to contact us is by emailing us at [admin@elkgrovetownship.com](mailto:admin@elkgrovetownship.com).

2016 is a Presidential Election year and it is important that you come out to vote in both the Primary Election on Tuesday, March 15th and the General Election on Tuesday, November 8th. The ability to vote for your government leaders is one of the defining elements of a democracy and every citizen's participation in this process is important. Every vote does count! I urge you to exercise this very special right and vote.

To be eligible to vote you must be a U.S. citizen, be at least 18 years of age, and be registered. You must complete your registration thirty days prior to an election. The voter registration deadline for the Primary Election is February 16th, 2016.

There are numerous options on how to register to vote.

1. Visit the Cook County Clerk website at <http://cookcountyclerk.com/elections/registertovote>

Follow the instructions to register in one of three (3) ways:

- **Online:** If you have a valid Illinois driver's license or State ID., you may register to vote online by clicking on the "Elections – Suburban Cook County" tab at the top of page and select "Register to Vote" through the Illinois State Board of Elections website.
- **PDF:** If you don't have a valid driver's license or State ID, you can fill out a form online, print, sign and mail it in.
- **Paper:** You can download a mail-in voter registration card. The cards are in multiple languages.

2. In person with a certified registrar:

- At one of Cook County Clerk's six locations [http://cookcountyclerk.com/aboutus/hours\\_locations](http://cookcountyclerk.com/aboutus/hours_locations)
- At a Municipal or Township Clerk Offices.
- At an Illinois Secretary of State driver's license facility.

3. In addition to these "regular" voter registration procedures there is one (1) special program for eligible residents who miss the 30 day window. Under the **Grace Period Registration and Voting Program** eligible residents can register from February 17th through March 14th (the day before the election) at select locations in the area. You must have two forms of valid identification and you must vote at the same time that you register. The locations for the Grace Period Registration and Voting Program can be found on the Cook County Clerk Website at <http://cookcountyclerk.com/elections/registertovote>.

Once you've registered to vote via a "regular" registration process you have three ways to vote in the Primary Election. The three methods are:

- **Election Day Voting:** You can vote at your designated precinct polling place on the Primary Election day from 6:00 a.m. through 7:00 p.m. You should receive a letter from the Cook County Clerk notifying you of your polling place but if you do not receive the letter you can get the information online at <http://elections.il.gov/>.
- **Early Voting:** Early voting will be held at select locations from February 29th through March 14th. The voting locations can be found at <http://cookcountyclerk.com/elections/registertovote>.
- **Mail-In Voting (Absentee Ballots):** You can request an absentee ballot online from the Cook County Clerk website (no later than March 10th) or you can pick up a ballot at the Township office. Absentee ballots must be postmarked no later than March 14th and must be received within 14 days of the election to be counted.

I hope this information is helpful. I realize that all of these different procedures may be confusing; however, the Township staff is available to assist you, should you need help. Please don't hesitate to call (847-437-0300) or visit the Township office at 2400 S. Arlington Heights Road, Arlington Heights Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.


- Elk Grove Township is happy to announce that we have partnered with the Salvation Army and now offer the **Nicor Gas Sharing Program.**

## News from your Highway Commissioner

### Who's Responsible for Keeping Drainage Ditches Clear?

Two complaints commonly phoned into the Highway Department are: "There's standing water in the ditch in front of my home," and "That pipe under the driveway is full of leaves and dirt." In areas of the Township that do not have curbs and gutters, ditch-and-culvert systems are in place to handle right-of-way and property drainage. They are designed to collect moisture from the pavement and elevated property and drain it into basins located at the lower end of the block.

To function as intended, ditch-and-culvert drainage systems depend on the mutual cooperation of the Township and resident. The Township is responsible for maintaining the drainage pipe that crosses under the road at intersections, the basin that the pipe drains into, and the sewer pipes the basin drains into.

Residents with driveways in curb-and-gutter areas are responsible for the driveway apron, curb, and flagging. Those with a ditch drainage system are responsible for the apron and drainpipe (culvert) beneath it. This means keeping the pipe clear of obstruction so water will flow freely through it, and repairs to the driveway if the pipe heaves creating a bump in the apron surface.

Water pressure from a garden hose should be enough to clear a culvert. However, if dirt and debris have become packed, a contractor may be needed. Ditch maintenance by the homeowner includes raking leaves, mowing grass and removing debris.

Regular cleaning of leaves and debris, which collect in drainage ditches, and culverts will assure that the system is ready to operate at maximum efficiency.

## Assessing the Situation

2016 is a very important year in the Cook County Assessment Cycle. This year is the Triennial Reassessment for our township. Although the exact date for the new assessment values to be released has not been shared with us, it is important for you to follow us on our website, [www.elkgrovetownship.com](http://www.elkgrovetownship.com) for further details on how to appeal these new amounts if you feel you have been over-assessed. We will also be sending an announcement via email to those of you who have chosen to share your email addresses. There will be a 30 day time period for you to make your appeal, and, as always, we are at your service to research comparable properties and assist in filing with Cook County. Be aware that you will have an additional opportunity to appeal through the Cook County Board of Review. In order to further assist you, we will schedule multiple outreach programs for your convenience.



By now, those of you who have had the senior or senior freeze exemptions should have received your applications to reapply. If you have any questions or concerns, do not hesitate to call or come into the office.

There is a new Disabled Veterans Exemption that is now available. We await the application forms from the County. This exemption provides property tax relief to those veterans that have a certifiable percentage disability. There will be more information forthcoming.

First installment tax bills should be hitting your mailboxes by the end of January, due and payable March 1, 2016. Please remember that this bill is 55% of last year's total bill and does not reflect your exemptions, which will appear on the second installment.

If you do come into our office, please welcome Annette White, our new assistant. She is a wonderful addition to our team, and brings a willingness to be of service to our taxpayers.

We hope that 2016 will be healthy and happy for you and your family, and that we will try to make it a year of fairness and accuracy.

The following is a note that was received from a grateful job seeker that had met with one of the Township's General Assistance Caseworkers.

## A Note from Youth Services:

Whose Problem is This, Anyway?

Tips from the Parenting Tool Box



Have you ever noticed your 3 year old stubbornly wanting to zip up their own winter coat when you try to do this for them? Or, your 13 year old deciding to wear a light jacket (or no jacket at all) when the temperature is below freezing?

The therapists in the Youth Services Department of Elk Grove Township often hear about how these every day snippets of life unwittingly become flash points for conflict in the lives of families. Mind you, “differences of opinion” are part of normal and expected family life. But, here’s the rub, “what is the best way for parents to help guide children, while (at the same time) instilling in them the ability to guide themselves—so they can be responsible, productive adults later on?”

Let’s go back to the winter coats. No, your 3 year old does not have the capacity yet to decide whether to wear a coat in the winter. But, they want to show their own mastery by zipping up the coat. Great! Say, “do you want to zip your own coat today?” If s/he nods yes, allow it, and compliment your child. It is giving them incremental control, and increases their self-esteem.

Now, what about that 13 year old, who may feel that his winter parka is not particularly “cool,” and is not interested wearing it? With all the areas of potential power struggles in a household (curfew, chores, schoolwork, etc. . . .), is this really one to do battle over?

We would suggest, “no.” Here’s why; if your 13 year old does not wear a jacket, and is cold, “whose problem is this, anyway?” You (the parent) are perfectly warm in your coat. Being cold is THEIR problem. At most, you could say, “I’d suggest wearing something warmer, but it is up to you.” No power struggle. The teen expresses their own autonomy. And, somewhere down the line (because of their experience), they will decide for themselves that it’s a good idea to wear warm clothes in cold weather. Experience is the best teacher (what are called “natural consequences”).

Of course, all parents know that they often have to implement rewards and punishments around rules and expectations (essentially, making a child’s poor choices “a problem for them”). But, there can be a lot more harmony in many households if parents can look for opportunities for “natural consequences” to be the best teacher. To that end, ask yourself a few key questions:

- 1) If there is a problem, whose problem is this, anyway?
- 2) Is this a normal problem (many are)?
- 3) Can I let it go, and think of this as a “learning experience?”
- 4) Or, do I need to insert consequences?

These questions may help to simplify matters. Of course, if conflicts and behavior seem severe, you can always call Youth Services staff to talk it over.
